## End of Year Results Evaluation

**Reading** 

Gaps closed or closing in years 4, 5, and 6 but maintained in 1, 2 and 3. PP children making better than expected progress in all years, apart from year 4 where progress is at expected.

#### Writing

More PP than non-PP children achieving EXS+ in years 4 and 6. Gaps closing to less than 10% in years 1, 3 and 5. PP children making better than expected progress in all years, apart from year 2 where progress is at expected.

### <u>Maths</u>

PP pupils are outperforming non-PP pupils in year 1. Gap is less than 10% in year 3 and 6. Significant gaps need to be closed in years 2 and 3. PP children making better than expected progress in all years, apart from year 2 where progress is at expected.
